

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



THE EDGE OF THE NIAGARA ESCARPEMENT












The Cup and Saucer has ~8 km of hiking trails, renowned for sheer drops, stunning vistas, and the famed adventure loop. Accessible from Hwy 540 between LC and M'Chigeeng.

Sandhill Cranes

Sandhill Cranes are one of the oldest bird species and have been around for at least 2 million years. They have at least 18 different vocalizations, from piercing rattles to low purrs, even a snoring-like call while roosting. They are great dancers. When a male gains the attention of a female, they both present an elegant low bow, followed by a series of specific movements, calls and leaps, creating a stunning sight!

You can spot Sandhill Cranes almost anywhere, from Mexico to Siberia, but from Spring to Fall, they love the nearby Island's farmer fields.

They may fly as many as 400 miles in one day during migration.



Algoma Eastern Railway opened the LC Swing bridge to trains in 1913. In 1946, CPR saw the bridge modified for cars. Today, it is an Ontario Heritage Site and stays in the closed position except for the first 15 min of each daylight hour during the spring, summer & fall, when it opens to permit marine traffic to pass. In 2021, a replacement plan was announced which will include a new two-lane swing bridge nearby.










Highlighting the Art of Nature. MINDEMOYA CAVE away dirt & heavy fallen rocks we could gain safe access. The beautiful natural carved

The cave was carved out by water after the last Glacier 10 000 years ago. It is ~ 9 to 15 ft high and 85 ft deep. With the help of an Inco engineer and his workers to clear

away dirt & heavy fallen rocks we could gain safe access. The beautiful natural carved Dolomite rock walls & the smooth washed out limestone floor are now highlighted.
